DISCOVERY

Looking through my collections of various acetates I just discovered a hitherto unnoticed 8" acetate bearing the following pencil remarks on the "label":

SIDE 1: 3 Cent Jump - Duke Ellington 4/8/44 - Actual Broadcast from the Hurricane, N.Y.

SIDE 2: Main Stom - " " " " " "

"3 Cent Jump" is, of course, actually "3 Cent Stomp". "Main Stom" goes into "Sentimental Lady".

DEMS comments: Our Swedish member Forbjörn Ahlström, Stockholm, has discovered a portion of a DE Hurricane broadcast not known to exist until now. And what makes it especially interesting is that we have earlier not been able to listen to above versions as played during this Hurricane stay, 30Mar44-6Jun44. This bc portion should be numbered 44-8a in the Recording Ban Period volume of "The Wax Works of DE". This is a NBS pick-up from the Hurricane April 8, 1944, 11:30-11:45 P:

3 CENT STOMP

DE RN JN RN JR RS EWLm(no)

MAIN STEM

DE RS JH RS c1JHta JN EWLm LB

SENTIMENTAL LADY

(a few bars)

It is thrilling to experience that discoveries like this is still happening, and likely to be so in the future too - and in a way it is astonishing to establish once again that so much from these periods were found here in Sweden. Most of the now known 1943, and much of the 1944/45 ones were found here. What will happen next?

A contemporary advertisement (daily paper) 1944

... AND HERE IS AN ARTICLE ON DUKE (from a contemporary magazine):

DUKE ELLINGTON, world-famous composer of jazz magic, never lets a musical idea grow cold. Whether it occurs to him in a restaurant, taxicab or turkish bath, he makes for the nearest available keyboard, runs off what he has written, does some musical embroidery on the theme—and it is ready for his orchestra to play.

A composer whose genius and unique style have put him right up alongside the leading figures in the "classical" school of music, Ellington has been compared by Stravinsky to Stravinsky, Orson Welles to Welles, and Percy Grainger to Frederick Delius. Swing fans compare him to no one—but he is the single composer in whom all camps find agreement as a truly distinguished musician.

Last year and the year before he presented two programs at New York's Carnegie Hall. At the second one the stirring tone poem "Black, Brown and Beige" was premiered—a brilliant composition which took forty-five minutes to play. It was at this concert also that the Duke was presented with a plaque in celebration of his 20th anniversary, on which were the signatures of such musical literati as Leopold Stokowski, Deems Taylor, Arthur Rodzinski, and a regular "Who's Who" of musical "greats".

Over in Europe before the War, Ellington's appearances were attended as seriously as concerts of the "Three B" music—Brahms, Beethoven and Bach. England, Holland, Sweden, France, Norway and Denmark turned out to hear him on his European tours, and he's played many a session of requests for royalty, including the present Duke of Windsor.

One of the Duke's latest tunes about town last spring was the enigmatic "Do Nothing Till You Hear From Me". And at about the same time he introduced two other new tunes, characteristically swifty in quality and title: "Suddenly It Jumped," and "Stomp, Look and Listen." But it isn't easy to keep up with the latest in Ellingtonia—Duke has composed well over a thousand songs and jazz works of concert length.

Famous for his amazing energy, Ellington is known to stay awake for as long as four days on a couple of hours of sleep. When he does go to bed, it's never before dawn.

His language is often of his own coinage—he talks in

All the same - all selections have earlier been issued:
Side A, all 5 titles were included on Stardust 203 (the
date ought to be 29Apr 53, from a Portland dance date);
the two Jul 64 titles are the same as included on Jeyce
1073, from Marine Ballroom, Atlantic City, originally to
be found on AFPS OMS 6208 (Tootie) and OMS 6212 (Call Me);
the 23Jun 45 Treasury Show bc items have been available on
AFPS DWD-19, Caracol 434, Musidize 5135, Fairmont 1008,
Gramercy 7705, and, of course, on DETS 11; the last title
came from a Treasury bc and has been available on
AFPS DWD-15, Ariston 12029 (PDC 1018), Caracol 433, Fair-
mont 1004, and, of course, on DETS 9. In short, this is
a LP we can all forget about completely - or???

In their recent releases in the Jazz Heritage Series, MCA
has been producing a very good product without phony ste-
ree and most of the time without echo enhancement. They
also claim to transfer directly from metal parts and shel-
lac test pressings "without any filtering". A few of the
tracks on this record appear to have been transferred from
older tapes used on earlier Lp releases and some echo is
present but there are some nice surprises here for us all.
From the very introduction of Oklahoma Stomp it is appar-
ent that a new and interesting take has been used. The
other track which, if genuine, (Maori -B) is also a new
item to deal with. The remaining tracks are not new to
any of us.

To refresh your memories, the original Jungle Band re-
cording ("Maori", Br 4776)(claimed by discographers to be
from master E32448-B) has a band ensemble before Whetzel's
lead trumpet chorus. The early 1934 re-issue (Br 6812)
indicated as E32448-A, has Johnny Hodges playing over the
band ensemble before Whetzel's trumpet chorus. Our new
MCA Lp has the same Hodges introduction on both the A & B
takes. The version of Br 4776 is not here! (Valburn)

The result of Valburn's further investigations on "Maori"
was handed over to me for further checkings. The check-
ing of the two Maori versions on MCA revealed that the
difference between the takes is very small. There is one
distinct moment in the solo of Joe Nanton that differs
and the hardly to hear Barney Bigard solo at the end is
different. It also appeared that the speed is different.
And when listening to Joe Nanton's solo he plays an extra
note on the A-take, which is not present on the B-take
(the first one on the above MCA release). Both takes are
so very much alike, that I can not believe them to have
been recorded on different sessions. It is also harder to
believe that two different arrangements were played on
one and a same session. So, together with Valburn's re-
search information and my own findings, I would give you
the following as a result:

I have spent many, many hours making comparison listenings of these with these in my own collection; most are the previously issued takes, but I made a couple of discoveries along with many corrections to the listed discographical information:

BLACK AND TAN FANTASY: This is take -B, not -C as indicated.

THE MOOCHE: Information seems to be correct, as indicated, except that this issue contains an extra cymbal crash at the end not to be found on any of the other issues in my collection.

DOIN' THE VOOM VOOM: Info. is correct. OLD MAN BLUES: The indicated info is not correct; this is a "new take" different from -4 (Jazz Archives 21), different from -6 and -3 on RCA 741-048. I can readily tell the difference by listening to the soprano sax solo of JH which is different on each of these four issues/takes.

CREOLE LOVE CALL: Info is correct. SLIPPERY HORN: This is given as -A; I have compared it with the so-called take -A on CBS 88035 and the so-called take -B on Blu-Disc 1001; all three sound identical to my ear.

HYDE PARK / LIVE AND LOVE TONIGHT / HARMONY IN HARLEM: Info is correct. BRAGGIN' IN BRASS: Correct date should read March 3, 1938.

DUSK / A PORTRAIT OF BERT WILLIAMS / KO-KO / SEPIA PANORAMA: Info is correct.

JUMPIN' PUNKINS: This is take -1, not take -2 as indicated. BLUE SERGE / RAINCHECK / MOON MIST: Information is correct.

I DON'T MIND: I have compared this with RCA LPV-541 and FXM1-7301; all three sound the same, i.e. -1 and -2

seem no different from my ear. This is probably take -2, as I believe take -1 was unissued.
ROCKIN' IN RHYTHM: Correct master number should be 12310, 13210 as indicated.
UP AND DOWN, UP AND DOWN: This is supposedly copied from Columbia CL-1033; I don't believe there ever was a Colum-
bia CS-8091 or any other stereo issue released. The Franklin Mint issue is definitely monaural, not stereo, and
sounds exactly the same as that previously issued on Columbia Special Products JCL-1033, also monaural.
TOURIST POINT OF VIEW / ARISTOCRACY A LA JEAN LAPITTE / HEAVEN: Information is correct and in stereo.
SARATOGA SWING / BIG HOUSE BLUES: Information is correct.
TOUGH TRUCKIN': Correct date should read March 5, 1935.
CARAVAN / I CAN'T BELIEVE ... / TEA AND TRUMPETS / CHASIN' CHIPPIES / BOYS FROM HARLEM / AIN'T THE GRAVY GOOD / RENT
PARTY BLUES / BARNEY GOIN' EASY / BLACK BEAUTY: Information is correct.
CHARLIE THE CHULO: This is take -3, not take -1 as indicated.
"C" BLUES / PITTIER PANTHER PATER: Information is correct.
BODY AND SOUL: I have compared this to take -2 and -3 as both issued on RCA FXM1-7072, but I am still not sure which
take is on Franklin Mint; the Franklin Mint set indicates this to be take -3.
TOMK: The correct matrix and take number should read D61518-1, not D6V818.
THE CLOTHED WOMAN: No take number indicated but this would be take -1.
BLUES FOR BLANTON / JANET / AVALON: Information is correct.
STOMPY JONES: Correct date should read February 26, 1959; also in stereo.
LES FLEURES AFRICAINES: I have the title as "Fleurette Africaine" or "Les Fleurs Africaines"; also in stereo.
THE BEAUTIFUL AMERICAN: Information is correct and in stereo. (Carmack)
DEMS comment: Your observations arrived to us a few weeks after we published Bull83/4, where OLD MAN BLUES / BODY
AND SOUL / MOON MIST are mentioned under the heading "New Discoveries". Most of the above confirms what is men-
tioned there. One of the things that still puzzles us is the said different take of MOON MIST.
Note: On TEA AND TRUMPETS the CBS-REALM issue no. should read 52628 (not 62528).

DISCUSSIONS - ADDITIONS - CORRECTIONS

● SOME DISCUSSION ON THE DEMS REVIEW OF UTD 2007 (Bull83/3-3): In our latest DEMS Newsletter (Vol 3/N^o 2) where we showcase the contents of UTD 2007 on the second side: "Your Love Has Faded" we reported, and in error, that "No Master Number Assigned". The reason for this mistake is that we took our information directly from the recording log sheets of 20May57. Not only is no master number shown but as is common practice of using the master number on the studio aural slating by the A&R man (Irving Townsend) before each recorded take, this is not done on these master tapes of the session. AFTER we read DEMS' comments we went back to our earlier files and discovered the following:

7 March 1957 CO 57522 Your Love Has Faded (3 complete takes, 1 breakdown) re-made 20 March 1957
20 March 1957 CO 57522 Your Love Has Faded (Nine takes in all and our take on UTD is the last one, -9)
(This is now correctly shown on the jacket of UTD 2007)

So if we total all "takes" from both sessions there are indeed 13 as stated in the DEMS Bulletin. Finally, once again we are in error in regard to the Piano Improvisations when we stated in our DEMS Newsletter (No Master Number Assigned). However DEMS is incorrect in stating that the "five Piano Improvisations were made at the beginning of the March 20th session". They were the last items recorded after most of the band was dismissed and only Duke and the rhythm section remained. The assigned master number is C057338 and the original file card reads "Improvisation (Blues, Ragtime, Rhumba)". NOW, we do have an interesting problem. This assigned master number refers to the final three piano improvisations (released on "World of Duke Ellington" Vol 3). Apparently it was not the intention of the recording company or Duke Ellington of using those first two piano improvisations. As Ellington discographers should we accept the assigned master number of C057338 to cover all five piano improvisations as done on 20Mar57? I would certainly be interested in comments on this from other DEMS members. (Valburn)

DEMS: We regret - this is not possible.

● LOS GRANDES DEL JAZZ: I have found copies of the well-discussed @DJ records under the label "EUROPA JAZZ":

GDJ-12 same as EJ-1010

GDJ-27 same as EJ-1022

GDJ-79 same as EJ-1039

I have not seen copies of GDJ-64 or 94. I have seen cassettes of this label, but so far none with Ellington.

How about your own record shops - keep an out-lock.

(Hoefsmit)

● I GRANDI DEL JAZZ 23 (see Bull83/4-1): I can't find "The Hawk Talks" but as reported by Carnack "Mood Indigo". Consequently it seems to be two different pressings of this issue. It could be useful could Mr. Lundin compare "The Hawk Talks" version with the one contained on I Grandi Jazz GJ-27, on sleeve and label said to be from 1957, but by Mr. Hill stated as coming from a Summer 1953 broadcast not listed in DESOR (see Bull81/5-5). Maybe it is the same version. (Cumps)

● I GRANDI DEL JAZZ "Billy Strayhorn" (see Bull83/3-2): The original issue of this record was GDJ-07. GDJ-23 is a re-issue of "07". Apparently the producers had some leftover stock of "07" and collated these in the "023" record jackets. (Valburn)

● ACCORD SN-7200 (Bull83/3-1): It can now be positively stated that all items are from Capital Transcriptions only. There are none from World as reported in error in the DEMS Newsletter and DEMS Bulletin. (Valburn)

● TREND (US) TR-529 (Bull83/3-3): Originally issued on Reprise R9-6097/RS-6097 and not on 6093 as shown in the DEMS Bulletin. (Valburn)

● HOLIDAY BALLROOM, Chicago, 571110: I just have fragments of tapes NN-06 and -07 stereo (good sound indeed) said not be mentioned in DESOR. Should this mean that the contents is different from DESOR 682? DEMS given titles and DESOR 682 are quite different. A few and rapid comparisons made show:

- Same DE presentations as intro to "Love You Madly" and "Diminuendo/Crescendo"

- but very different running times:

"Autumn Leaves" (approx. 5:33 on my tape / 5:55 on NN-tape)

"Diminuendo" (approx. 9:41, my tape / 10:31 on NN)

I would be very grateful to have your commentaries.

(Götting)

Asland comments: At the time the NN-stereo collection was received much work was needed to sort out what was in it, because of very few annotations. Among the difficult ones were the Holiday Ballroom portions.

In my own collection most of the titles were found, but also:

- following "Jeep's Blues": All Of Me / Just Squeeze Me / / Skin Deep

- following "Good Gal Blues": Mood Indigo / Caravan

The date is stated as 571110. In Sanfilippo's listings there is an "A Train" sandwiched between the above mentioned "All Of Me" and "Just Squeeze Me". In Tinner's book "All Of Me"/"Caravan" are left out, but the session comes to an end, as in Sanfilippo, stating "Caravan" to be followed by "Laura" and "Mood Indigo".

The session referred to above is not mentioned in DESOR. Instead another one is mentioned, presumably from the following day, and equivalent with what also is mentioned in Tinner's book, the date simply given as "Nov 1957".

The differences in timing mentioned by you could be explained knowing the circumstances told above.

There were several pick-ups from the Holiday Ballroom stay.

DISCUSSIONS-ADDITIONS-CORRECTIONS (ctd.)

I seem to have uncovered an "error pressing" of a DE issue on a mint copy of Victor 20-1598 (78rpm). For some reason, my copy has the exact same song on both sides (I Don't Mind is not there on side one as the label indicates); the label indicates different songs on each side and the "var" provides different numbers for each side. Why this was done, one can only wonder. (Carmack)

DE'S GREATEST HITS (Bull183/4-4): I can add to the information two more titles (not from 23Feb63): PYRAMID is from 1Feb65, and SATIN DOLL from 19Jan65. This is already known to everyone using the DESOR discs. (Hoefsmit)

FRUG BOX TPB-100/2 (Mercer Ellington with the Warsaw Philharmonic - The River - Three Black Kings - New World A-Camin): Does anyone know

- 1) Recording date(s) and location(s)?
- 2) Personnel of the Ellington orchestra?
- 3) Parts of "The River" being played? (Bask)

MUSICRAFT (J) YW-7535-EV "DE, 1946" (Bull183/3-2): Is this record actually on a Musicraft label? About three years ago Japanese Columbia issued a 12" lp with the same release number and title. I have the record in my collection. (Valburn)

In addition to Mr. Åkesson's info on "Ring Dem Bells" (see Bull183/4-3), the "A Train" intro & close used for the Musidisc JA-5103 release comes indeed from the 450512 broadcast, but is also used for the intro on the V-Disc issue though, especially for V-Disc, over the music, intro to "Harlem Airshaft" is added. This "Harlem Airshaft" is also from the 450512 broadcast. The DESOR 3420 information ought to be deleted and transferred to 450512. (Cumpa)

LONGINES SYMPHONETTE SOCIETY SYS 5112/5116 (LWS-382) (Bull183/3-2): This five record set contains material taken from the NBC broadcasts of the program "Telephone Hour". The DE track, "Mood Indigo", is taken from the telecast of 10Feb59. (Valburn)

About the marquee photo in Bull183/4: Both films advertised at the two Loew's State Theatre the week of May 25, 1939 and June 1, 1939. The Duke Ellington orchestra played Loew's State Theatre the week of May 25, 1939 to May 31, 1939. The Milt Britton Orchestra (and a different film) replaced the bill on June 1. (Stratmann)

Nelson Trotman is in DESOR said to replace Junior Raglin from 451020 to 451110. The presence of JR is however confirmed by the announcer intro to "Perdido". (Cumpa)

DEMS comment: As correctly stated in the DETS-27 notes JR is on bass. The first time NT is present, as far as we know, is on a 451022 performance.

I have for several years wondered why someone has not issued an LP those DE issues which have only, so far to my knowledge, been released on either 78rpm or on 7-inch LP singles; I am talking especially about those released on the Columbia and Mercer labels from the year 1947 and afterwards. This might be a special project for DEMS or, perhaps, the Meritt Record Society. Comment, anyone? (Carmack)

DEMS: We are investigating the possibilities.

According to the Swedish jazz mag "Orkester-Journalen" (Sep-83) the German Record Company "MPS" has ceased to exist. This gives me the reason to remind on the following: As a Christmas gift to retailers and a few more there was a "Sonderpressung" issued in 1974 (stereo), MPS 0666.605, which included a DE Trio track, "A Prelude To A Kiss" (6'10"), in the liner notes commented as "Das besonderes ... is ein Stück mit dem Duke Ellington Trio, dass ich anlässlich eines Hauskonzerts am 10.2.1965 mit-geschritten habe. Dieser Mitschnitt wird wohl kaum jemals auf einer anderen Platte erscheinen. Ich freue mich sehr darüber, dass ich Ihnen von Duke Ellington, der wie kein anderer die Geschichte Der Jazz verkörperte, eine bisher unveröffentlichte Aufnahme vorstellen kann. Sozusagen in memoriam eines der Grössten Genies des Jazz und als Dank für die vielen aufmerksamen Förderer des MPS-Repertoires. (signed) Hans George Brunner-Schwer. (Lyttkens)

I wish to follow up my prior inquiry regarding Accord SW-7200 lp (see Bull183/3-1). I have subsequently made listening comparisons of the DE selections from this LP with the corresponding titles on the Hindsight series of LP's, with the following result:

IN A JAM: Same as on Hindsight HSR-127 (recorded 17Jul46).

MOON MIST: Same as on Hindsight HSR-127 except that the piano introduction has been edited out, i.e. the Accord version starts with the violin (recorded 11Jul46).

EVERYTHING GOES: Same as on Hindsight HSR-125 (recorded 28Mar46).

TIP TEE TOPIC: Same as on Hindsight HSR-126 (recorded 28Mar46).

THE UNBOOTED CHARACTER: Same as on Hindsight HSR-127 (recorded 16Jul46). (Carmack)

MOON MIST, 3Dec41, on Standard Transcriptions: "Wax Works of DE" states Ray Nance has a violin solo in the beginning preceding Johnny Hodges solo, but to me it sounds more like a trumpet solo by Wallace Jones (unlike all other versions of Moon Mist where Nance solos on violin before Hodges). The fidelity of my record is rather poor - a DEMS comment would be appreciated. (Bask)

DEMS comment: Thank you for pointing out this mistake in the "Wax Works" - you are quite right, it is not Ray's violin, instead, in this case, he is using a muted trumpet. (ctd. next page)

Familiar material. 9Jun45 selections same as on Caracol 433, Fairmont 1004 and DETS 9; Jul64 same as on Joyce 1077; 12Jun53 same as on AFRS One Night Stand 3358 & Joyce 1079; 23Jun45 same as on Caracol 434, Fairmont 1008 and DETS 11; 27Jun53 same as on AFRS ONS 3365 and Joyce 1079. The cover says stereo, and also gives the information the album may contain previously recorded material. This is very well understandable since Duke has been dead for about ten years. If they went to say "previously issued material" they are certainly right again. Thus we can all ignore this release. (Hoefsmit)

S A D NEWS

Francis Williams died October 2, 1983, in Houston, Texas. He played with "Fats" Waller's Big Band, with Edgar Hayes, Claude Hopkins, Horace Henderson, et. al. To us he will of course be best remembered for his time with Duke Ellington during 1946-1949.

1971-1974 The DUKE ELLINGTON'S STORY ON RECORDS is finally completed with this volume, the sixteenth in the series.

An almost unbelievable discographical effort has now come to a successful end. Everything that has been positively said earlier concerning the DESOR project could be repeated adding great thanks on behalf of every serious Ellington collector everywhere!

In case there should still be someone not familiar with this work you can take a look at the example shown here presenting a part from the chronological section, mainly chosen because here we find another of the hitherto unidentified selections from the famous MFD 5-LP Box, where so many items still has to be traced as to their true origins.

As before our Bulletin is open for additions, etc., concerning DESOR. One addition we feel should be mentioned right away is Duke's very last appearance on stage, which took place at the Northern Illinois University on March 20, 1974. The performance was recorded in full.
