Ellington Matinee Red Letter Event For Negroes Here

Amarillo's dusky population celebrated in a big way last night.

Due principally to the efforts of Matthew "Bones" Hooks, old-time negro cowboy and leader in his community, a midnight matinee was arranged at the Paramount Theater for negroes only, at which Duke Ellington and his Harlem Aristocrats entertained 630 patrons in an hour and a half show that proved to be an all-time red letter event for those present.

Bones had interviewed Ellington and theater officials, and arranged the concert. Some of the patrons came in big cars; some drove in from other towns. All were bent on having a big time, and they had it.

Ellington also played a sacred concert in one of the negro churches between shows last night for the older members of the colony, and for those who could not attend the midnight show. This, too, was arranged by Bones.

Those attending the Paramount show got almost as much kick out of inspecting the beautiful interior of the show house as listening to Duke's music.

GIRL SLAYERS BEING SOUGHT

MEN COMPANIONS BELIEVED IMPLICATED IN DEATH OF BEAUTY

EL PASO, Nov. 9 (U.P.)—Officers today attempted to follow a trail of burned clothing along the highway from Van Horn to Pecos in their efforts to trace the killers of an attractive young woman whose body was found on the desert east of Van Horn, where they found a blood-spattered blue silk shirt, partially burned.

Coroner James Neill, Van Horn, said the shirt had been dipped in gasoline.

Clothing Burned

"The slayers, apparently continuing east, had soaked the shirt in a can of gasoline, lighted the clothing and tossed it from their speeding automobile," Neill said.

"There was no evidence of a fire where the shirt was found."

Mr. Neill said the slayers apparently had lighted the woman's clothing piece by piece and strewed it along the highway.
