How Dutch Solve Dilemma Of Barge Pupils' School

(Most readers are familiar with Bill Dillingham's weekly column. Each week he provides Paddock Publications with unusual aspects of Europe and European life.)

AMSTERDAM—Holland has grammar schools for its young sailors. In this country where canals and barges serve the transport needs of the people, for a long time there was the problem of how to enable barge-family children to go to school.

Most of the barges that are used in European countries are family affairs. A house is constructed near the stern of the vessel, the barge keeps gets married and raises a family, and the children grow up as inland sailors.

On special occasions when a barge is away from all schools for an extended period, lessons are sent out by classmates through a kind of canal courier service.

THIS HAS BEEN organized by a special section of the schools. A sharp eye is kept on the attendance records of all students.

Unique education methods have grown out of this unusual situation. When studying history, for example, pupils might be assigned the task of visiting certain sites of interest in Holland. Old castles, scenes of battles and other historical spots are open for the students to see in their "travels". Then reports are written up on what was seen.

Canals go almost everywhere in Holland, so that the teachers take advantage of this unusual daily-life of their students.
