

County Relief Program Costs \$99,089 In May

HARRISBURG — Cash expenditures for Warren County relief during May totaled \$99,089 — up from 196,076 during the preceding month, the State Department of Public Welfare said today.

Aid-to-dependent children assistance took the largest chunk of the relief cost for the county at \$73,229 in May (\$70,330 in April).

Other Warren County relief expenditures during the month (with April in parenthesis) —

Old age assistance — \$3,966 (\$3,479); State blind pensions — \$2,015 (\$2,009); Federal-State blind pensions — \$1,803 (\$1,502); general assistance — \$2,938 (\$10,381); and aid-to-disabled assistance — \$8,938 (\$8,322).

Meanwhile during the same month \$3,000 in "restoration and reimbursement" payments was recovered from relief recipients in Warren County.

Of the recovered total of \$3,000, reimbursement by public assistance recipients in the county amounted to \$3,021.40 — representing repayment of relief monies made on a voluntary basis and through collections on property encumbrances where members of families no longer occupied residential properties; through payments made following settlement of personal damage actions; and through repayments involving court support orders.

Restitution payments — where recipients had misappropriated or failed to report facts which would have made them ineligible for benefits or because of errors in computing cash assistance grants — totaled \$78.20 for the county for the month.

In comparison, recovery of public assistance funds from county recipients during the preceding month of April amounted to \$3,096.35 — \$3,831.35 via the reimbursement route and \$86 by restitution.

New Federal Program Will Now Help Students

A new federal program, passed after most graduating seniors left high school, can provide several hundred dollars in aid for students now beginning their education at best colleges, universities, community and junior colleges, hospital schools of nursing and vocational and technical schools, according to information from county school district Superintendent Frank Christy.

The program is the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant. It's new, authorized by Title I of the education amendments of 1972, part of the Urgent Supplemental Appropriation recently signed by President Nixon.

It authorizes \$12.1 million in basic grants. The maximum allowable grant is \$1486, with provisions that —

— the amount will be reduced by the amount the family is expected to contribute;

— the amount will not exceed half the amount needed for total educational costs;

— the amount will be prorated on the available pool, so that maximum awards apply that can be covered fully by the basic grant; students will receive partial grants.

The Office of Education expects that the program will provide a maximum award of between \$500 and \$600 and an average award of about \$246.

The new feature of this program, says the federal agency, is that the student can be assured that his award will be available to him without regard to the school he is attending.

Since many students are unenrolled about the program, due to its late enactment, Christy urges all students who may be eligible to obtain an application blank at the guidance office of their high school, which is open throughout the summer.

Fish Loss At Hatchery Said \$7,500

CORRY — Officials at the Cory Fish Hatchery, competing their cost of the fish loss which grew out of an electrical outage at the facility last Wednesday night, said \$2,288 fish died.

William Willis, hatchery foreman, said fish weighed 7.57 pounds. Cost of raising trout in the state's hatcheries is about a dollar a pound.

So the loss which took place when electricity which operates the pumps at the hatchery failed would be \$7,500, Willis said.

The hatchery foreman said that will respond on the part of more than 100 fishermen prevented the loss of 20,000 other fish at the facility. Involved in the hatchery operation are brook, rainbow and palomino rainbows.

The fish lost would have been stocked in area streams next spring.
