Frank W. Stewart Is Awarded Wife's Estate Despite Will Contest

Brothers and Sisters Tried To Break Will On Ground Of Undue Influence

Surrogate James A. Foley has decided to award the estate of the late Elizabeth Josephine Thompson Stewart to her husband Frank W. Stewart of 267 West 110th street, over the protest of her brothers and sisters who objected to the probate of Mrs. Stewart's will which was offered for probate on May 28, 1925, the probate proceedings being terminated by the death of the testatrix.

The Thompson family, prominent and well known figures in metropolitan circles, are John, Perry and George Thompson, brothers; Mathewson Charles May Gardner, William Adams and Susan Cummings, sisters. They desired in their objections that the will be not only annulled but that Mrs. Stewart, who executed the will in May 1922, was already just after that date a lunatic and incapable of making a valid will.

Final Hearing January 8. Mr. Stewart was represented by Attorney Thomas H. Smith of 799 Broadway, the Thompson family having the assistance of Attorney Philip J. Jones of 42 East street, Brooklyn. On January 8, 1926, the probate court was held by Surrogate Foley named Mr. Stewart as an incompetent administrator, over the protest of Attorney Jones.

Dining Car Chef and Waiter Are Killed In Train Wreck In Florida

Thierville, Fla.—A P. Hill, dining car waiter, and C. H. Leach, chef, were instantly killed in a rear-end collision near here Sunday, January 10. About thirty other persons were injured in the wreck.

The crash occurred when the south-bound Overseas Limited ploughed into the private car, Patriot, belonging to Mr. Durant, attached to train No. 36 on the Florida East Coast Railroad. The train had resumed its journey after allowing another train to pass, when the limited rounded a curve traveling at fast speed and struck it.

Hill and Leach were in the cooking kitchen of the car and were killed instantly. Pann, the porter, was in another part of the train and although severely cut and bruised was able to assist in the rescue of other injured.
